District Overview

District Overview

Mandate

The English Language School Board is responsible for the implementation of secondary education services as prescribed by the Department of Education, primarily through the *School Act*. The district offers programs from Kindergarten to Grade 12 within the English language schools in Prince Edward Island.

As of September 2012, the new school district was operating 57 schools in 28 communities and providing educational programming and services to 19,557 students. The district has diverse school populations, with schools ranging in size from 82 students to 953 students. School configurations in the district vary as follows:

The English Language School Board (ELSB) has a very diverse student population as well, with approximately 836 students from 84 foreign countries enrolled in its schools. 719 of these students attend school in Charlottetown. A total of 265 students receive specific instructional support in *English as an Additional Language* (EAL).

Appendix A provides a further description of the mandate of the English Language School Board, as legislated in the *School Act*.

Mission

The newly formed English Language School Board adopted for the 2012-2013 school year the existing missions from both former school boards:

The Eastern School District is committed to excellence in education. In partnership with the community, we will provide a safe and caring learning environment in which all students have the opportunity to reach their potential and to face the future with confidence.

The Western School Board is committed to providing students with relevant, high quality learning opportunities that will prepare them to become adaptive, successful citizens of the global community.

The English Language School Board engaged in a process to develop a Vision Statement for the new school district and will share its vision when its governance policies are passed by way of a resolution of the Board and will then set this vision as part of the new *Strategic Plan for Student Achievement*.

Location

- The English Language School Board has two main administration offices at 234 Shakespeare Drive, Stratford, PE, C1B 2V8 and at 288 MacEwen Road, Summerside, PE, C1N 0J1.
- The district operates 57 schools throughout the province; the East Prince Career and Technical Education Centre (C-TEC) in Summerside; three maintenance depots in Cardigan, Charlottetown, and Summerside; and a transportation and maintenance depot in Elmsdale.

Lines of Business

The English Language School Board has two lines of business:

1. <u>Curriculum Delivery and Program Services (Pre-Kindergarten to Grade12)</u>

Before entering kindergarten, students are provided the opportunity to participate in orientation to the school environment. Trained and qualified Hearing Education Auditory Resources (HEAR) teachers provide specific itinerant services to students who are deaf or hard of hearing. The school district works in partnership with the Atlantic Provinces Special Education Authority (APSEA) to provide specialized teacher supports to students who are blind or visually impaired.

The district provides the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (DEECD) prescribed core curriculum and other approved programs, based on Department criteria and district and individual school resource capacity.

Career guidance and personal counseling services are available in all schools.

Various extra-curricular and co-curricular activities are available in schools.

2. Transportation

The English Language School Board is responsible for transporting students to and from schools in compliance with the *School Act* and Department of Education policies.

Board of Trustees

In April 2012, the Province of Prince Edward Island amalgamated both English school boards into a single English Language School Board.

In June 2012, the Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development appointed Patsy MacLean from the Eastern School District and Gary Doucette from the Western School Board as interim trustees for the new board. The two appointees continued trustee governance work until the newly appointed board took office.

On January 1, 2013 the following twelve (12) trustees were appointed by the Minister of Education to form the governing board for the English Language School Board:

District Departments

The English Language School Board is managed by the Superintendent of Education and has five operational departments:

- 1. Corporate Services (including financial management and services, property and maintenance services, payroll services, and student transportation services)
- 2. Human Resources
- 3. Curriculum Delivery
- 4. Student Services
- 5. School Effectiveness

Schools

During 2012-2013 the English Language School Board operated 57 schools throughout the province. Construction was completed on Spring Park Elementary School in March of 2013 and students who were temporarily accommodated in other schools in Charlottetown returned to their new school that month. A complete listing of schools and their populations are provided in *Appendix B*.

Students

In this school year, 19,577 attended the district's schools. School student populations ranged from 82 (kindergarten – grade 8) students in Georgetown Elementary School to 953 students (grades 10 - 12) at Charlottetown Rural Senior High School.

Staff

As of June 30, 2013, the English Language School Board had approximately 1,571 instructional staff and 2,060 support staff for a total of approximately 2,633 full-time, part-time, and casual employees.

Department of Education

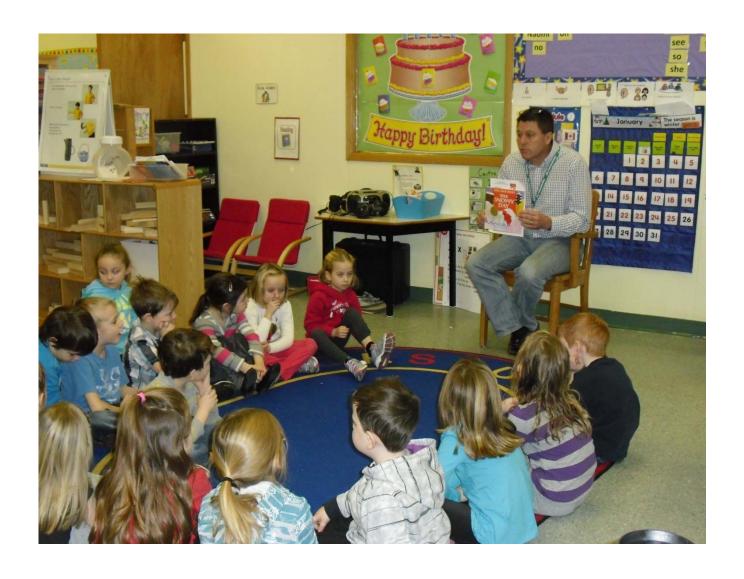
The English Language School Board's most significant partnership is with the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development which provides the Board with funds for infrastructure, personnel, and learning resources to enable the Board to fulfill its mandate. The Board's work supports the strategic direction of government. Employees of the English Language School Board work collaboratively with departmental staff for various purposes, including:

- Delivery of training and professional development for staff.
- Development of curriculum resources.
- Implementation of curriculum.
- Construction and renovation of schools.

School Councils

School councils are a critical link between schools and parents and play a key role in reaching out to the broader community. School councils may be established in accordance with *Section 66* the *School Act*. The councils serve in an advisory role to principals regarding various matters and to build awareness among parents. School councils have a role in the development of the school development plan for student achievement.

Many schools operate home and school associations which fulfill the role of school councils, as per Section 66 (5) of the *School Act*.



Strategic Plan for Student Achievement

Strategic Plan for Student Achievement

Upon amalgamation of the two former school boards into the new English Language School Board, a one-year strategic plan to address student achievement was developed for district-wide implementation. The plan and supporting actions targeted:

- 1. Excellence in student achievement.
- 2. Focused professional development.
- 3. Organizational effectiveness.

1. Excellence in Student Achievement

The School Effectiveness Department worked in collaboration with the Curriculum Delivery Department to provide strategic advice and support to schools. Schools participated in Goal-setting Workshops to ensure that each school had a SMART goal to increase literacy. The district provided inservice to School Literacy Teams on data collection, data analysis, and goal-setting. The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development assisted schools with data analysis of provincial assessment results and identification of individual school literacy goals. The following is a representation of this training:

To support this goal, 16 literacy coaches worked with kindergarten – grade 6 teachers in 37 elementary schools.

2. Focused Professional Development

Professional learning for administrators focused on Instructional Leadership. Principals and Vice-principals attended sessions with Dr. Lyn Sharratt and Dr. Avis Glaze. Topics included: Putting Faces on the Data, High-yield Instructional Strategies, Effective Coaching, and Instructional Walks and Talks. The School Effectiveness Department also provided professional development to school administrators, as included in the following summary table of Focused Professional Development:

Moderated Marking Sessions were held for Language Arts teachers – grades 7, 9 and 4 (French Immersion). As well, district office staff partnered with personnel of the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development and seven pilot schools to identify educational foundational outcomes (learnings) in kindergarten – grade 9 English Language Arts and Mathematics.

3. Organizational Effectiveness

The priority in this area was to build collaboration within the new school district and between schools and school councils/home school associations by communicating the common goal for student achievement throughout the district. As well, to operate effectively the school district was required to initiate an alignment of services and policies under one board.

School Effectiveness collaborated with Curriculum Delivery in the development of a Common Report Card for grades 7-12. As well, School Effectiveness developed a consistent approach to support StudentsAchieve (SAS) in all 57 schools. All departments were required to begin the consolidation of the Western School Board and Eastern School District practices related to supporting schools.

School Effectiveness realigned the supervision of Family of Schools. Supervisors had scheduled school visits and coordinated school tours for the Superintendent of Education and the Director of Human Resources. This allowed supervisors to develop relationships with school administration and staff in all schools of the English Language School Board.

PROVINCIAL ASSESSMENT RESULTS

The English Language School Board participates in various provincial assessments in mathematics and literacy at grades 3, 6 and 9. At the district and school levels, assessment results help target professional learning and inform resource allocation.

Challenges,
Opportunities and
Highlights

CHALLENGES

The Western School Board (WSB) and Eastern School District (ESD) amalgamated in July of 2012 and the new Board of Trustees began their duties as the governing board for the English language School Board on January 1, 2013. The school district grew to:

- 57 schools
- 57 principals
- 72 vice-principals
- 1,500 teachers
- 19,577 students and their parents

This increase required district-wide approaches to both governance and operations. The newly formed board and the amalgamated school district worked with policies, regulations, and procedures from both the former Western School Board and the Eastern School District and plan to do so until all governance policies and procedures, as well as all operational policies and procedures, are developed for the English Language School Board.

Provincial assessments of student achievement indicate that progress is being made, in particular in the area of literacy, and it is therefore important for the school district to sustain its focus and strategic approach and determine further appropriate supports and interventions to support student achievement in other areas of learning.

Corporate Services spent most of the 2012-2013 fiscal year planning for the implementation of a new financial system as well as the adoption of a new fiscal year. The system became operational on April 1, 2013 and the Board now operates with an April to March fiscal year.

OPPORTUNITIES

With the amalgamation of the two school boards, the new school district has the opportunity to align operational policies and practices resulting in one common approach across the province. The new district has begun implementing one performance evaluation model for instructional staff and school administrators. This initiative will ultimately include one approach to support staff performance appraisal as well.

Upon the full implementation of reporting structures for grades K – 6, the new English Language School Board will implement common reporting structures for grade 7-12 subjects.

Further moderated marking sessions will be included in teacher professional development and collaborative learning initiatives in order to bring consistency to student literacy assessment in all schools. The grade 2 French Immersion and grades 3 and 8 Language Arts have been identified for professional development in moderated marking for 2013-2014.

The school district will continue its work with grade 9 mathematics teachers and extend the initiative in partnership with Department of Education and Early Childhood Development to support grade 6 mathematics teachers.

The district will also re-define the role of Numeracy Consultants to increase capacity regarding coaching/supporting K-6 teachers with effective numeracy instruction.

The district will also review foundational outcomes and determine appropriate supports that are required by teachers who teach combined grades. The amalgamation of school boards provides opportunity to teachers involved in multi-grade and multi-course instruction throughout the whole province to share successful practices and determine the support required for their common needs.

HIGHLIGHTS

English Language School Board and the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development

The following include some of the school district highlights in 2012-2013. Provincial assessments were administered at grades 3, 6 and 9, and included:

- Primary Literacy and Numeracy.
- Elementary Literacy (English) and Numeracy (English and French Immersion).
- Intermediate Literacy and Numeracy.

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development continued to support the school district's grade 9 mathematics teachers. Through improved communication the School Effectiveness Department strengthened its working relationship with technology staff and Information Technology Shared Services (ITSS). The English Language School Board partnered with the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development to host two successful *French for the Future* career fairs for grade 9 students. Teacher and school district personnel represented the English Language School Board on a variety of Department of Education and Early Childhood Development curriculum and assessment committees.

Within the School District

In order to align high school leadership functions with successful teaching and learning, the school district re-defined the role of High School Department Heads. During 2012-2013 the work of three Curriculum Coaches and two Secondary Consultants supported school level cross-curricular initiatives at intermediate and senior high levels. Monographs on high-yield teaching strategies, reading records, and mentor texts were developed. All dual-track high schools (those with French Immersion) participated in DELF. There was collaboration with various partners on the Beginning Teachers Induction Program and Joint Staff Development. In supporting the effective use of technology in education, the school district provided support to schools to purchase and install interactive whiteboards, LCD projectors, wireless keyboards, and document cameras.

SUMMARY

Our annual report provides an opportunity for us to reflect on the work completed in the previous year, celebrate our successes, and determine areas that need to be addressed in the future. Baseline data are now available for identification of areas to be addressed in the new strategic plan and will serve as reference point against which we can judge our progress.

Our focus is to ensure that we support our children and youth in kindergarten to grade 12 so they may learn and succeed. We look forward to sustaining our focus on literacy and determining additional goals that will ensure all students are challenged and experience enjoyment as learners in the English language School Board for Prince Edward Island.

Appendix A

School Board Mandate

(Legislation: School Act, Cap. S-2.1)

G. Responsibilities of Trustees

- 39. School trustees have the following responsibilities:
 - (a) to attend meetings of the school board and exercise the powers and duties of a trustee in good faith;
 - (b) to comply with the requirements of the regulations respecting conflict of interest;
 - (c) to comply with all other requirements of this Act, the regulations, the Minister's orders under subsections 63.2 (5) and (6), the Minister's directives and the policies of the school board. 1993, c.35, s.39, 2010, c.26, s.3.

N. Responsibilities of School Boards

- 49. A school board shall, subject to the regulations, the Minister's orders under subsection 63.2(5) and the Minister's directives:
 - (a) provide for instruction in an educational program to all persons who are enrolled in its schools and eligible in accordance with the Act and the regulations;
 - (b) provide for the recruitment, employment, management and evaluation of staff of the school board and identification of staff development needs;
 - (c) manage such facilities and equipment as may be necessary for the safe and effective operation of the school system;
 - (d) provide for the transportation of students;
 - (e) manage the financial affairs of the school board effectively and efficiently;
 - (f) monitor and evaluate effectiveness of schools;
 - (g) ensure the development of, and approve and monitor School development plans;
 - (h) encourage good relations among schools, parents and the community and promote family and community awareness of the importance of education.

The ELSB proposed Policy and Operational Procedure on Recruitment and Hiring attached hereto as Schedule "A", be and is hereby adopted and will take effect immediately.

The following Policies and Regulations of the former Boards are hereby repealed effective immediately:

1. Nature of operations

The Board has the responsibility to provide primary and secondary education requirements for English speaking students in Prince Edward Island. The Board is funded by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development of Prince Edward Island.

The Board was created on January 1, 2013 as a result of the changes to the School Act during 2012. The amendments resulted in the dissolution of the former Western School Board and Eastern School District (the "Former Boards") as of December 31, 2012. All assets and liabilities of the Former Boards became the property of the English Language School Board. All contracts, agreements and policies of the Former Boards have been transferred to the English Language School Board.

These financial statements include the results of operations of the former Western School Board and Eastern School District from July 1, 2012 to December 31, 2012 and those of the English Language School Board from January 1, 2013 to March 31, 2013. Comparative figures are comprised of the financials of the Former Boards for the year ended June 30, 2012.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The Board follows the accounting recommendations of the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants.

Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost in the Capital Fund. Depreciation of tangible capital assets is recorded using the diminishing balance method at the annual rate of 2.5% for buildings and 20% for furniture and equipment. Depreciation is recorded on the straight line basis for school buses at 12%, used school buses at 25%, service vehicles at 20% and pavement at the rate of 20%.

Only those expenditures which exceed \$25,000 are capitalized in the Capital Fund. During the year, renovations and repairs and maintenance totalling \$559,263 (2012 - \$722,678) were expensed in the operating fund.

Revenue recognition

The Board follows the deferral method of accounting for grants for special projects. Grants restricted for special projects are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. The unexpended portion of grants received for specific purchases is deferred and used for the related future purchases. Unrestricted amounts are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

Revenue recognition (cont'd)

Government transfers are recognized as revenues when the transfer is authorized and any eligibility criteria are met. To the extent that transfer stipulations give rise to an obligation that meets the definition of a liability, transfers are recognized as deferred revenue.

Retirement allowances

The English Language School Board records an annual expense based on the change in the actuarially determined obligation for retirement allowance benefits, net of payments during the year. Funds to settle the obligation which are a liability of the Board will be reimbursed by the Department of Education of the Province of Prince Edward Island at the time of payment. Therefore, a receivable from the Department of Education is recorded for the entire retirement allowance amount.

Vacation pay

Vacation entitlements are expensed as earned.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and balances with banks, net of bank overdraft.

Pension plans

Instructional employees of the Board are members of the Teacher Superannuation Pension Plan of the Province of Prince Edward Island. The expense of the Board is limited to current year contributions as any shortfall in funding of the pension plan is the responsibility of the Province of Prince Edward Island.

Non-instructional employees are members of the Prince Edward Island Education Sector Pension Plan with both defined benefit/defined contribution components. The expense of the Board is limited to a matching contribution equal to the employee's portion.

Workers' compensation claims

The English Language School Board is a registered employer with the Worker's Compensation Board of Prince Edward Island for instructional and non-instructional staff. The Board records an annual expense based on payroll assessments in accordance with the Workers' Compensation Act.

Deferred salary plan

Teachers employed with the English Language School Board can participate in a program that allows them to defer a portion of their annual salary and take a paid leave of absence. The deferral results in a liability to the teachers, which is satisfied during the paid leave of absence. Funds to settle the obligation, which are a liability of the Board, will be reimbursed by the Department of Education of the Province of Prince Edward Island, and therefore there is an offsetting receivable due from the Department of Education.

3. Change in accounting policy

Effective July 1, 2012, the Board adopted CICA Public Sector Handbook Section 3410, Government Transfers. The new standard establishes standards for the recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure of government transfers. This change has been applied prospectively and prior periods have not been restated. Upon implementation of this change, previously deferred government funding relating to tangible capital assets has been recognized in the current year.

The retirement allowance balances are based on an independent actuarial valuation dated April 1, 2011, provided to the Pension and Benefits Division of the Province Of Prince Edward Island Civil Service Commission. The Province Of Prince Edward Island projects the total liability in the years between the tri-annual actuarial valuations.

The economic assumptions used in determining the actuarial value of accrued retirement allowances were developed by reference to expected long term market conditions. Significant actuarial assumptions used in the valuations and projections are:

Workers' compensation claims

In 2011, the Former Boards changed its method for insuring against workplace injury claims. It moved from self insured program to an employer assessed program under the Workers Compensation Act as administered by the Workers Compensation Board of PEI.

Under terms of the transitional agreement between the Former Boards and the Workers Compensation Board of PEI, a payment of \$1,207,615 was issued to the Workers Compensation Board of PEI in 2011. This payment is a deposit against future claims that the Workers Compensation Board of PEI will be responsible for the employees of the Boards for the period January 1, 2009 to December 31, 2013. Under the terms of the agreement, a measurement of the true cost of coverage for employees of the Board for the period January 1, 2009 to December 31, 2013 will be conducted by April 30, 2014. Based on agreed to formulas as to actual claims experience versus the premiums as would otherwise be payable to the Workers Compensation Board of PEI as assessed at the standard rates, a final reconciliation of the true cost to the Board will be determined. Any balance due or receivable, plus interest, will be settled in 2014.

The final amount is not readily determinable at this time. The Board has obtained an actuarial valuation of the potential contingent amount. This amount of \$137,385 has been accrued in the financial statements. Any variance from this amount on the final settlement will be recognized when it is paid or received.

9. Contingency

The Board has elected to self insure itself related to collision coverage. During the year, no events were reported in accordance with the policies of the collision contingency fund.

The Board has received funding from the Department of Education to fund expenditures which qualify for the collision contingency fund. These funds are being deferred on the balance sheet and unspent funds are reported as restricted cash.

10. Comparative figures

Comparative figures are comprised of the financials of the Former Boards for the year ended June 30, 2012. Certain of the figures on the 2012 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2013 financial statement presentation.

11. Subsequent event

As a result of changes in the School Act, effective April 1, 2013 the tangible capital assets of the Board are transferred to the Government of Prince Edward Island.
